Remembrance Day

ast Grinstead will come together on Remembrance Day, Sunday 9 November, to remember those who gave their lives in service.

The day will begin with a short gathering at 10am at the WW2 memorial at East Court, where the Town Mayor and the Royal British Legion will lay wreaths. The Last Post will be played.

At 10.30am, the parade will assemble in King Street, with the parade master organising the groups. At 10.45am, the East Grinstead Concert Band will lead the parade along the High Street to the war memorial, to be joined by St Swithun's choir and vicar just before I I am.

The service will feature a minute's silence and the reading of the names of fallen soldiers. Dignitaries, including a Deputy Lieutenant of West Sussex, will lay wreaths alongside those of the parade groups. After the service, the parade will continue along the High Street, finishing at Chequer Mead Car Park around 11.30am.

Road closures will be in place from 10.15am to noon along the High Street and London Road. Poppies will mark the parade route and notices will be displayed two weeks in advance.

Motorists should follow closure signs and marshals' directions.

Service sheets will be available on the High Street or can be downloaded from the Town Council website from the first week of November. The Royal British Legion will be selling poppies in the weeks leading up to the event.

Everyone is welcome to attend this important day of remembrance.

Devolution and Local Government Reorganisation Update

wo major changes are currently shaping the future of local government in Sussex: Devolution, and Local Government Reorganisation (LGR). While these are separate processes, they are progressing in parallel and will have an impact on how local services are governed and delivered across the county.

Devolution focuses on transferring more powers and funding from central government to a new regional level of leadership. For Sussex, this would mean the creation of a directly elected Sussex Mayor, providing a stronger voice for the area and greater local control over transport, housing, skills, and economic development. Elections for the first Sussex Mayor are expected to take place in May 2026, with four candidates already having declared their intention to stand

Meanwhile, Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) is part of the national move toward unitary authorities, which would replace the existing two-tier system of county and district councils. This aims to simplify local governance and improve efficiency.

On 26 September, all district and borough councils in West Sussex submitted their LGR proposals to government. The majority have expressed a preference for a two-unitary model (Option B), which would see Mid Sussex joining Crawley and Horsham to form one new authority. In contrast, West Sussex County Council has put forward a single-unitary model, covering the entire county.

The government will now review these submissions, with a decision expected around March or April 2026.


Goats at Queens Road Cemetery
