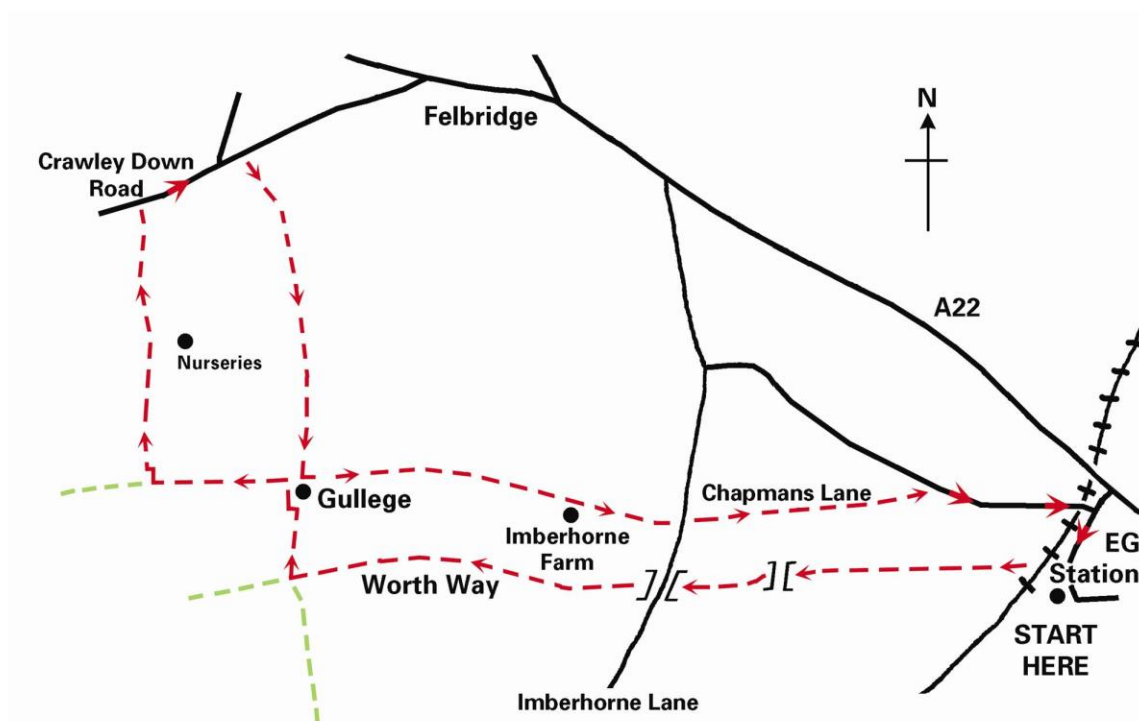

Worth Way Walk 3 or 5 miles

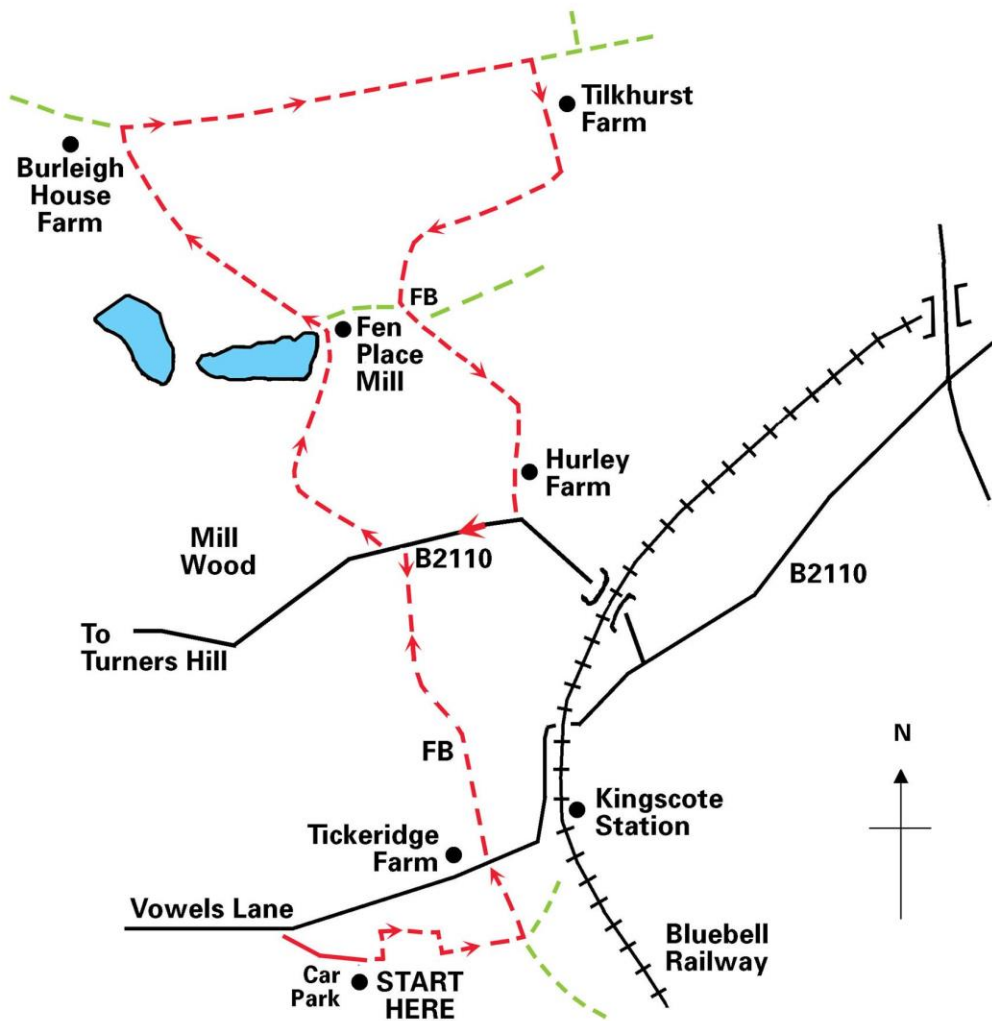


Starting Point: East Grinstead Station Car Park.

With views to the North this walk explores the countryside West of the town. It is a flat walking route which follows the Worth Way Westwards and turns North up to Gullege, a timber framed manor house of the early 17th century. Here there is a 2 mile loop. For the 3 mile walk turn right passing through Imberhorne Farm, across Imberhorne Lane and into Chapmans Lane. From here it is a short walk back to the station car park.

Fen Place Mill Walk 5 Miles

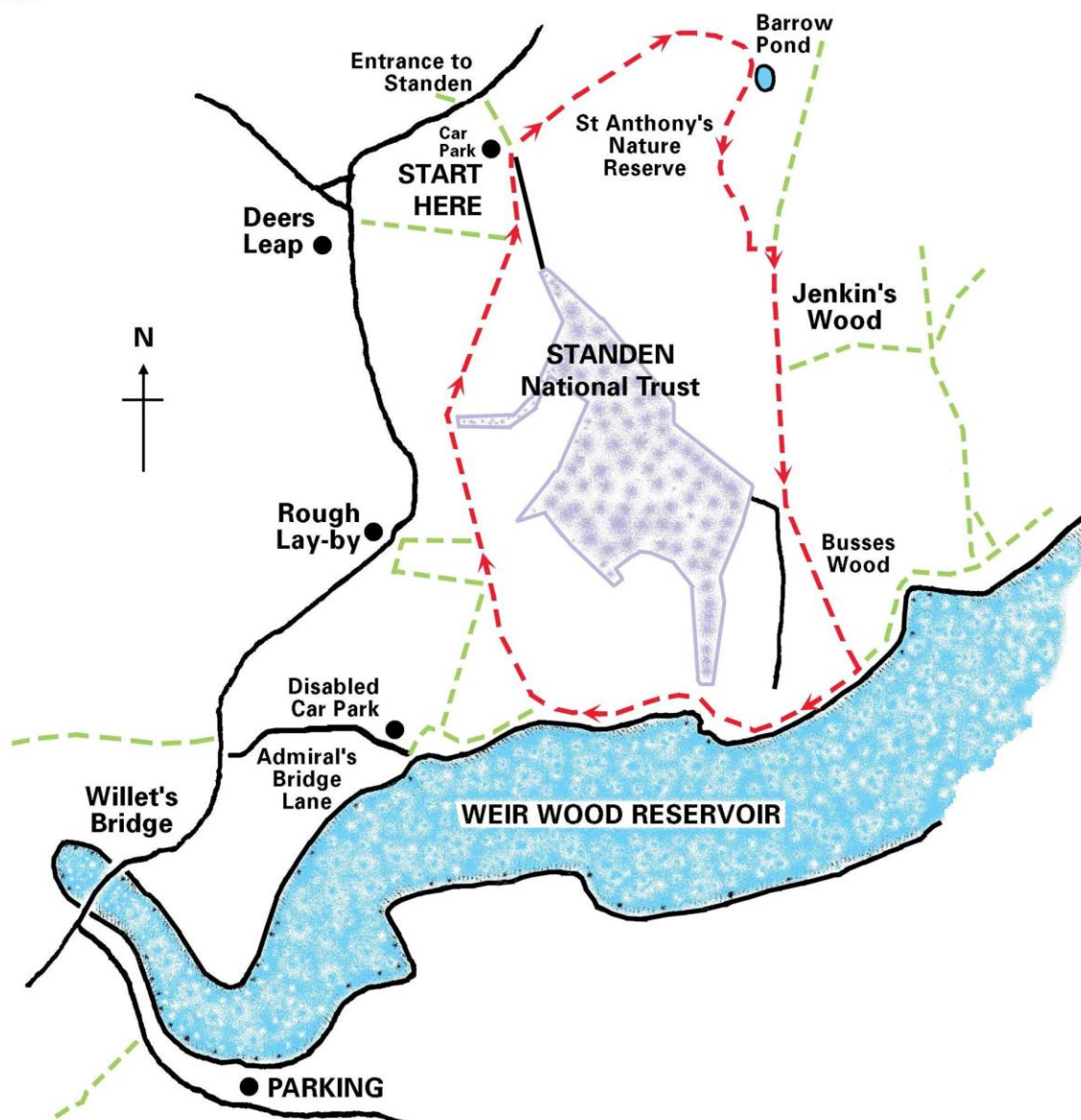


Starting point: Vowels Lane car park, Forestry Commission area.

An interesting easy walk. Tickeridge Farm was once the site of a flourishing iron works. The river Medway rises in Turners Hill and feeds into lakes at Fen Place Mill, the first mill to be placed on the Medway. There may be time for a ride on the nearby Bluebell Railway at Kingscote Station (when open) or a stroll through the Gravetye Estate.

Standen Walk 2 miles

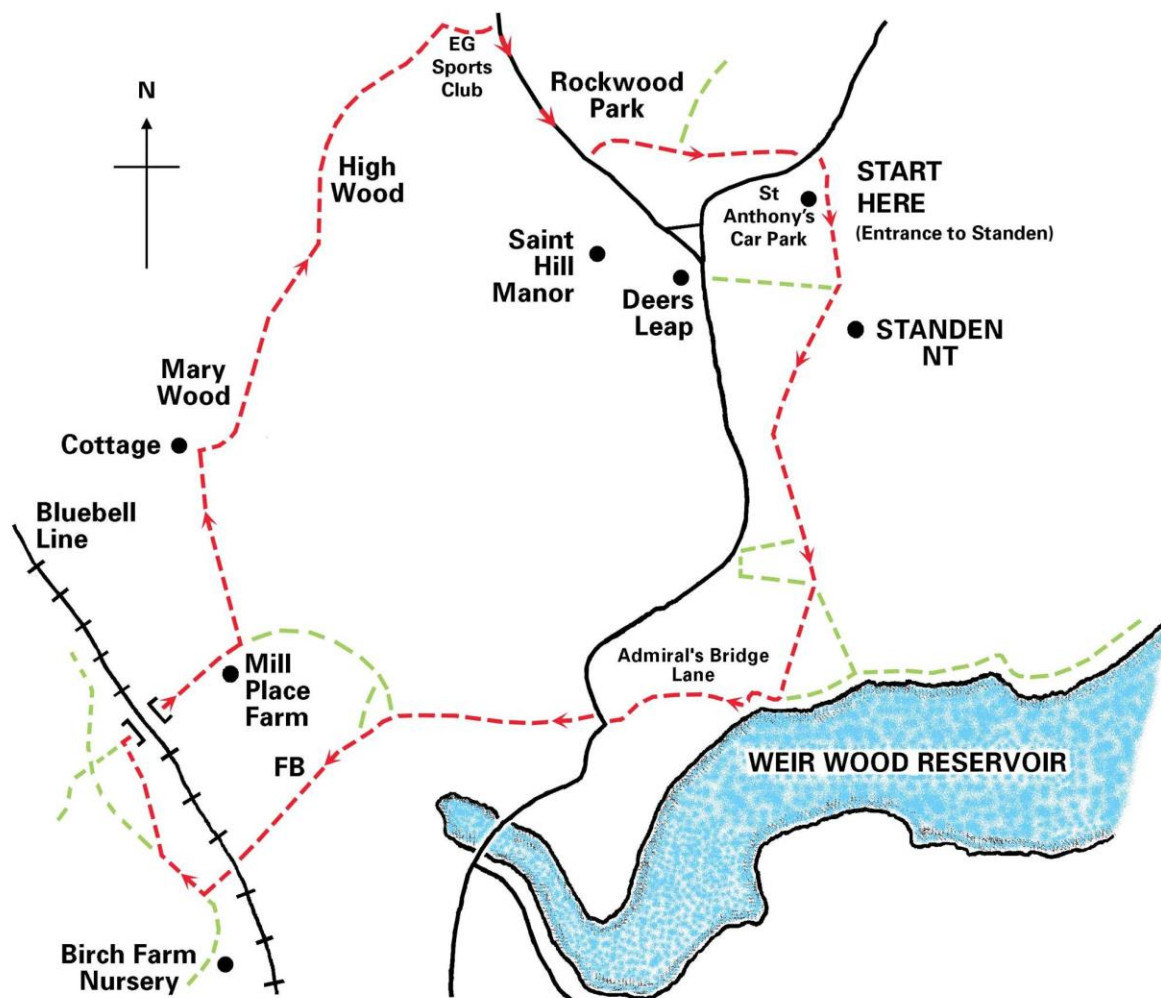


Starting Point: St Anthony's Car Park.

This is an area of open access and outstanding natural beauty. Although St Anthony's Reserve is now a National Trust area it is open to the public. There are several walks available. A visit to Standen is recommended. It was built in 1892 by Philip Webb, a friend of William Morris and his restored textiles and wallpapers are on display.

Stone Hill Rocks Walk 2 miles

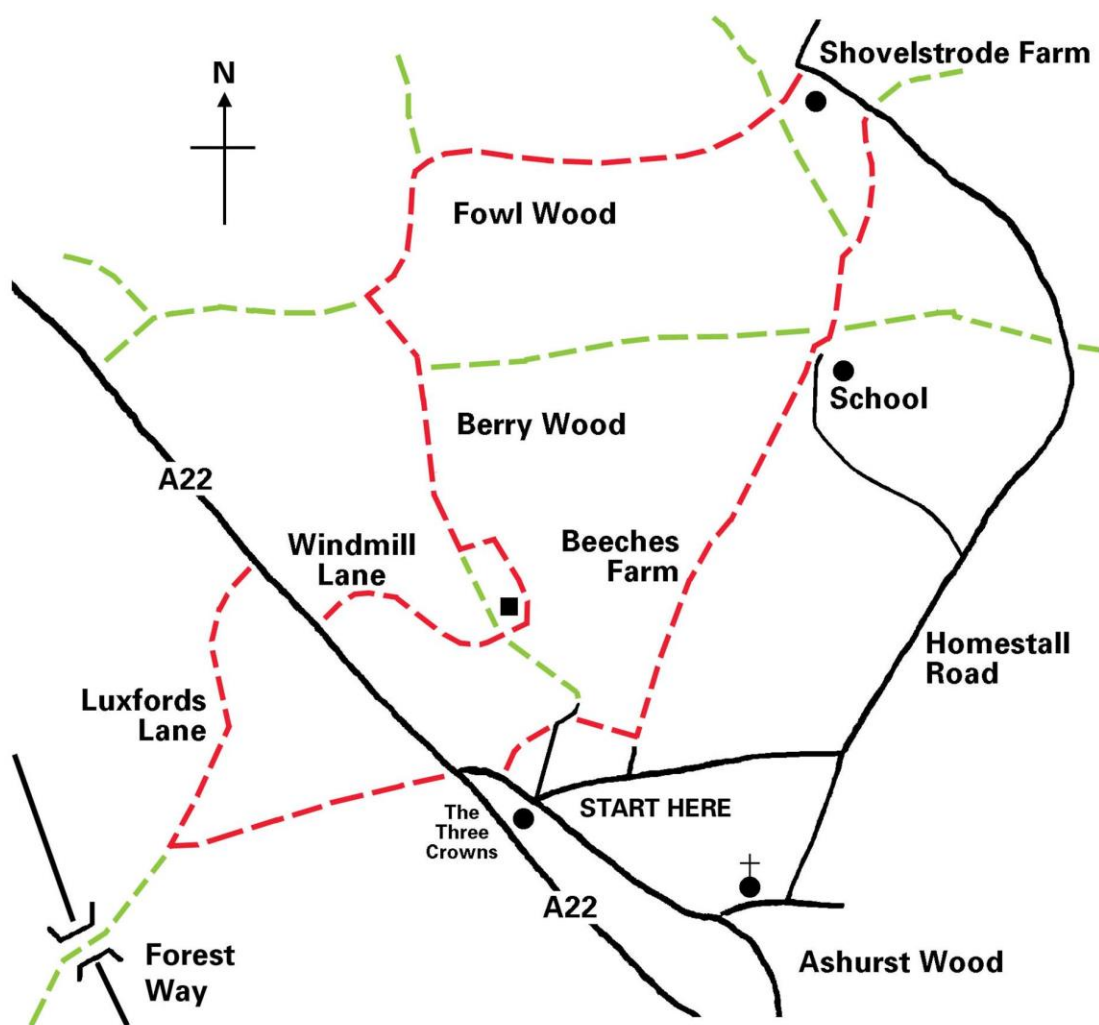


Starting Point: St Anthony's Car Park.

After passing Standen on your left, this walk goes Westwards and through Stone Hill Rocks, a favourite site for rock climbing. You will cross over and pass under the Bluebell Railway then, on gradually rising ground, towards East Grinstead Sports Club. After passing Saint Hill Manor entrance you will soon return to Standen and St Anthony's car park

Shovelstrode Walk 4 miles

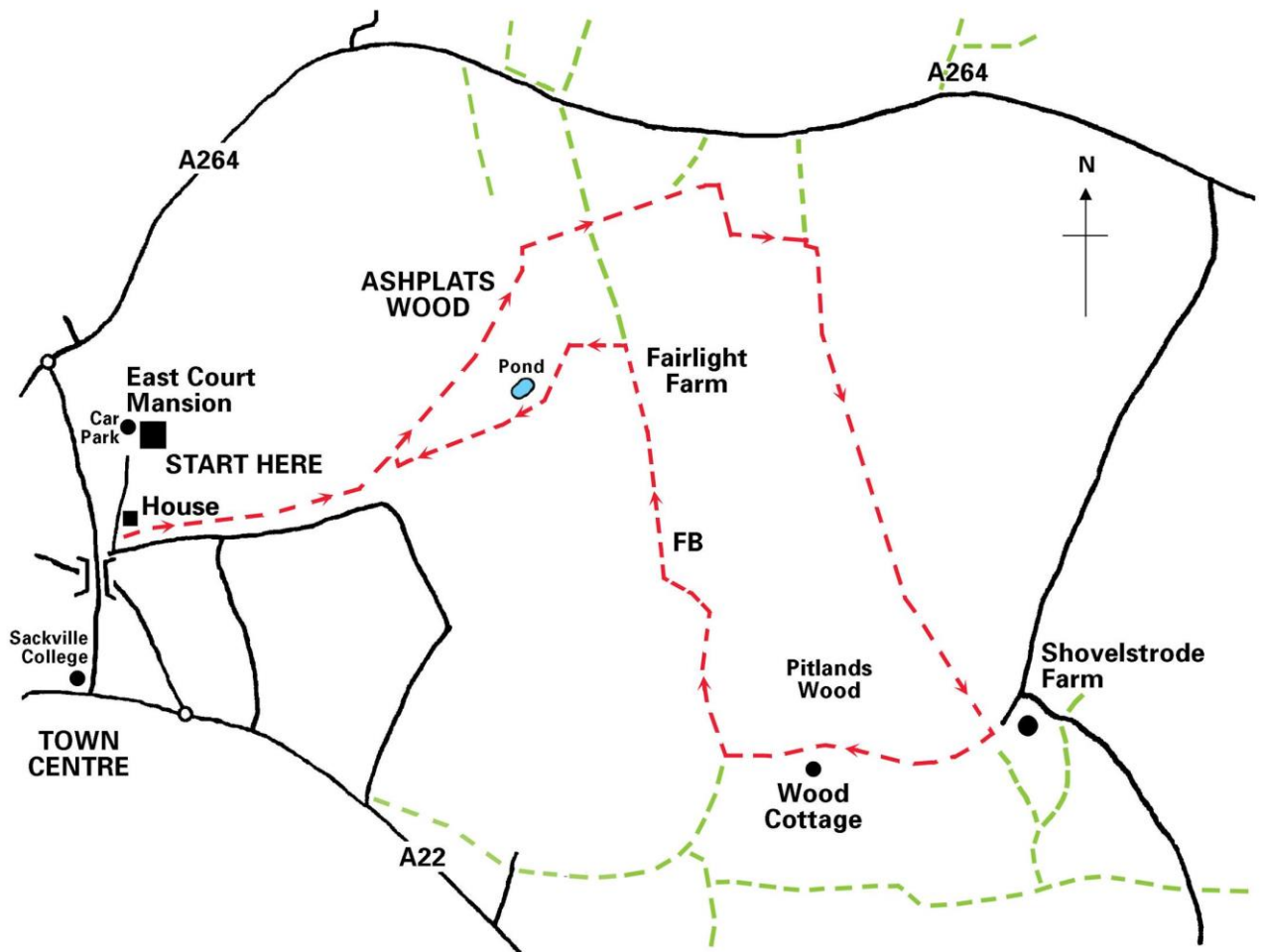


Starting Point: The Three Crowns pub in Ashurst Wood.

The Three Crowns was first recorded as an Inn about 1767. You will pass the grounds of Brambletye School with views across Weir Wood Reservoir. After passing Shovelstrode the lane goes up to a private house. Until recently a private school Stoke Brunswick, it was originally a small 14th century property known as Homestall. Early in the 19th century John Dewar, the whisky magnate, bought a Tudor Mansion, Dutton Manor in Cheshire, dismantled it and added it to Homestall which was then renamed Dutton Homestall.

East Court Walk 4 Miles



Starting point: East Court car park.

You start this walk to the right of the house at the entrance to East Court and will pass Escots Farm House, the original building is one of the oldest in East Grinstead built about 1285. There are views towards Tunbridge Wells and Ashdown Forest.
