The Mayoral Year

own Mayor, Cllr Bob Mainstone, has represented the Town Council at many events since being elected in May 2016. As Mayor he also holds the position of Chairman and presides over meetings of the Council. He has been an elected member of the Town Council since 2007 and is a Mid Sussex District Councillor for Imberhorne Ward.

Bob explains, "I thoroughly enjoy the responsibilities of Town Mayor and have aimed to honour every invitation from local organisations to attend their events. During my visits I always try to speak to as many people as possible and have found numerous examples of wonderful voluntary work. Our town is full of people who support and help others in many different ways."

There have been three special civic receptions hosted by the Mayor. The 75th and final AGM of the Guinea Pig Club took place at East Court, followed by a lunch for members of the Club, their families and guests. The 50th Anniversary of Town Twinning was staged in the Meridian Hall with the Mayor and guests from Bourg-de-Péage. Representatives from our five other twinned towns also joined the reception. Tom Mitchell, Olympic silver medallist and captain of the GB Rugby 7s in Rio, received a special certificate to mark his achievement. Tom grew up in the town and first played rugby at our local club. A reception for the hockey gold medallists is planned.

During his Mayoral Year, Bob is supporting three charities and several events have been and will be held to raise funds. He is



supporting the town Museum and the "Repairing Bodies and Souls" exhibition that tells the story of the Guinea Pig Club, the Bluebell Railway project to build a children's play area at Kingscote Station, and Jigsaw (South East) who support bereaved children and their families.

Bob's wife Christine is Mayoress. She is also a Town Councillor and a former Mayor. They have lived in East Grinstead since 1970. Bob worked at Sackville and Imberhorne schools during his 44 year teaching career. He recently received an honorary degree from Loughborough University for his services to education.

Cllr Julie Mockford is Deputy Mayor and has represented the Mayor at several events.

Budget 2017/18

ast Grinstead Town Council has pledged to invest in Meridian Hall, East Court public toilets and cemetery space in the forthcoming year. The Capital projects for the budget specify £70,000 of expenditure to start these projects which will see Council Tax rise by 6.7 pence per week (Band D).

The Council Tax for East Grinstead Town Council pays for community services like road sign cleaning, twitten clearance, weed spraying on paths and funds the Tourist Information Office and the summer events programme and will rise to £76.68 per year for a Band D property.

Also in the budget there are funds to start delivering on some of the aspirational policies on the Neighbourhood Plan.

Town Mayor, Cllr Bob Mainstone said, "East Grinstead Town Council offers such value for money for the resident, picking up services that are no longer supported by the Principal Authorities and also bringing innovative events to the town. We support community groups and charities in the town through grants and other support, often helping to bring people together to achieve their objectives." The Council Tax equates to £1.47 per Band D household per week, equivalent to the cost of a loaf of bread.

Neighbourhood Plan finally adopted

fter five years of effort the Town Council is now delighted to confirm that the very first Neighbourhood Plan for East Grinstead was adopted by MSDC on 2nd November, and now becomes a material consideration with legal weight when assessing planning applications.

This follows on directly from the successful independent examination held in July, and the overwhelming local referendum majority acceptance of 93% to the Plan on 20th October. Town Mayor, Cllr Bob Mainstone stated that this is a proud achievement for the town, and special thanks go to Town Clerk Julie Holden, town councillors, Kember Loudon Williams (planning consultant) and particularly to the many thousands of townspeople who have loyally supported the production of this Plan over five years.

The Town Council Caretaking Team

he Town Council own East Court Mansion, the Meridian Hall and the Old Court House. The buildings are very busy throughout the year and are popular venues for rent or hire. They are hired by community groups and residents for meetings, conferences, parties, weddings and other activities. The Mansion has offices for Council staff, and is also used for Town Council committee meetings.

To keep everything running properly the Council employs caretakers who are on duty whenever a hirer is in any of the buildings. Their duties include setting-up and clearing furniture for each hirer, cleaning the three buildings, duty fire warden and a duty first aider. The small team of caretakers covers seven days a week with flexible hours, depending on the hirer's contract. The caretakers also ensure that monthly safety checks are completed, including testing water temperatures, fire alarms, emergency lighting, fire doors, fire extinguishers, first aid boxes and building safety.


Cllr Adam Peacock, Chairman of the Amenities and Tourism Committee, explained, "Our buildings are in almost constant use and we have a wide range of activities and functions that need professional support from our caretaking team. The Town Council is always looking to improve facilities and we have recently refurbished the Council Chamber which will make it an attractive and more flexible room for public use."

2 016 was a truly memorable year for the Guinea Pig Club and for East Grinstead that became known as "The town that didn't stare"

The Guinea Pig Club members were those airmen injured in the Second World War who underwent the pioneering and largely experimental surgery of Sir Archibald McIndoe at the Queen Victoria Hospital. McIndoe's reconstructive work and treatment of burns is known across the world and the men who endured operation after operation named themselves "guinea pigs" after the animals used in laboratory testing.

The Club formed in 1941 with 39 patients — primarily as a drinking club — with membership given to serving airman having had at least two surgical procedures. By the end of the war the Club had 649 members.

In May the Town Mayor, Cllr Bob Mainstone, hosted a reception in honour of the historic occasion of the 75th and final AGM of the Guinea Pig Club at East Court. He welcomed nine surviving members of the Club, their families, Town Councillors and guests. Following the meal and speeches, everyone joined in the singing of the Guinea Pig Club Anthem "We are McIndoe's army; we are his Guinea Pigs".

In November the Museum officially opened the "Repairing Bodies and Souls" exhibition that tells the story of the Guinea Pig Club and the work of Sir Archibald McIndoe. Thanks to a generous Heritage Lottery grant and funds by private donors, the long-held dream to build a home for the archives of the Guinea Pig Club have been accomplished. This means that East Grinstead now has a museum of national importance.

Also in November HRH The Duke of Edinburgh unveiled a memorial to the Guinea Pig Club at the National Arboretum in Staffordshire. Seven of the surviving 28 members attended the event to make it very special. The memorial is an honour to the Club and its inspiring legacy.

In the New Year's Honours Jack Perry received an MBE for his services to veterans through the Guinea Pig Club. Jack was injured in 1944 at the age of 19 when his Halifax bomber crashed at take off. Suffering severe burns he underwent a total of 30 operations. Now 91, Jack has been Social Secretary of the Club for many years, organising events to keep alive the ethos of Archibald McIndoe that club members must stay together and support each other.

Planning Committee

he Town Council conducts its business through four Committees, and here we explain the function of the Planning Committee. The Planning Committee meets every three weeks and is part of Mid Sussex District Council's formal consultation process for making planning decisions. The Town Council make recommendations to the District Council who take these into account when a decision is made.

Town Councillors have had training to help them determine what is a material consideration when considering a planning application and are able to make comments as to whether an application meets the criteria of local and national policies. The East Grinstead Neighbourhood Plan is important in this process.

The Town Planning Committee considers every planning application submitted from within the parish boundary. Each application is carefully considered, and the opinions of Ward Councillors are taken first. Following questions and comments from the other Committee members, a vote is taken to recommend "approval" or "refusal" to MSDC.

Members of the public are always present at the meetings and they may ask questions on planning issues at the start of the agenda. The application plans are projected from computer onto a screen in the Council Chamber and explained to the Committee by the Chairman.

The Chairman of Planning is Cllr Jacquie Russell. She comments: "My Committee take their work very seriously and give each application detailed scrutiny. Ward members are vital to the work of the Committee and they are encouraged to visit sites before the meeting so that they have a full understanding of applications. We make our recommendations with reference to the policies in our adopted Neighbourhood Plan."
