FOLLOWING a survey into East Grinstead residents' hopes and ambitions for the next two decades, the Town Council is urging everyone to take part in the second round of consultations which is taking place now. Councillors who took to the streets for three consecutive Saturdays in November to canvas the opinion of residents received 640 feedback forms, including 176 filled-in online. And with the replies now collated, it seems the highest priority for most people is the redevelopment of the town centre, followed by highways and business development. Environmental concerns came in fourth place, followed by housing, sustainability, leisure and health.

The survey was carried out to inform the Neighbourhood Plan which is newly introduced in the Localism Act 2011, and allows for a Neighbourhood Plan to be drawn up by a community. The town's Plan will have to fit in with the broader objectives of the District Plan within a national framework. But once East Grinstead's has been decided on, it cannot be disregarded by Mid Sussex District Council, said Town Clerk Julie Holden. "The emphasis of Neighbourhood Plans must be to encourage growth, therefore a Neighbourhood Plan cannot simply say 'no'. But once our Plan is agreed, we will set the ground rules which developers will have to stick by in terms of the type of development they can build, its environmental impact and its sustainability.

"The referendum will be a straight yes or no option. It will be to adopt or reject in entirety. This is why the majority views are needed and the options are being put out with the impact of this. For example if money is to be spent on infrastructure, the Town will need to identify how many homes will be needed to raise sufficient money from the Community infrastructure levy to pay for this. The bottom line is clear. No money, no investment - and the money will come from the levy on developers for new build.

"But if they don't want Mid Sussex District Council making decisions about the future of East Grinstead over the next two decades, a 'yes' vote is absolutely paramount."

Three towns Three days One Marathon

EAST Grinstead will be playing host to the opening leg of a three-day Marathon spread over the first of the May bank holiday weekends next year. The Three Towns Marathon will begin in East Grinstead on Saturday 1 May. The second leg will be at Burgess Hill on 2 May and the final race to the finish line will be at Haywards Heath on 3 May. Final details of times and routes have yet to be finalised but Olympic gold medallist Richard Leman and members of the current GB Hockey Squad will be attending, with the town's Paralympic contender Richard Schabel.

East Grinstead's historian retires

MR Michael Leppard, the town historian and the man behind the founding of East Grinstead museum, has decided to step down. Paying tribute to his work, Chairman of trustees Mike Hollins said: "Michael was the font of all knowledge. He campaigned for the museum, established it and then sustained it for more than 35 years, all as a volunteer. We hope we can still rely on his historical expertise which is unmatched. He has made a unique contribution to the history of the town."

PLANS for a Travelodge hotel over a retail shop have been put forward for the site formerly occupied by Caffyns garage. The new building will accommodate a 79 bedroom Travelodge on the upper floors and a major retail unit on the ground floor. As Travelodge does not provide facilities for food and drink, other than basic tea and coffee, the scheme offers potential for town centre cafes, restaurants and bars to promote their own businesses. The hotel and retail unit will also attract new clientele into the town which will benefit local traders and services. Town Clerk Julie Holden said: "The scheme has been needed for some time to renovate a very conspicuous area of the town. Hopefully the new hotel and retail unit will be a successful and a smart new addition to East Grinstead's town centre."

Olympic Torch coming to East Grinstead next July

EAST Grinstead has been chosen as one of the towns on next year's historic round-Britain tour of the Olympic Torch.

The torch will leave Land's End on 19 May, one day after the flame arrives from Greece, and will then be carried by 8,000 'inspirational torch bearers' on a 70-day journey of celebration around the UK.

Town Clerk Julie Holden called East Grinstead's inclusion on the torch route "an iconic moment in the town's history, which will live on in the memory of everyone who witnesses it ".

Full details have yet to be released, but the torch will pass through the town sometime on 17 July.

The public will be encouraged to line the route, and welcome the torchbearer, and afterwards the town's school children will be invited to take part in a sports event at the East Court estate. Deputy Mayor Liz Bennett, who as next year's Town Mayor will

perform the official welcome, said she was thrilled at the prospect of taking part in such an historic event.

"The Queen's Jubilee and the Olympic Games will make next year one to remember for all of us, and I will be proud and honoured to represent the town during the events planned to mark both these landmark occasions," she said.

The torch, which is being made by east London designers Edward Barber and Jay Osgerby, will travel for 12 hours a day, for 70 days, before arriving at the Olympic Stadium on 27 July for the lighting of the cauldron at the Opening Ceremony.

Thousands of people throughout the UK will have the chance to cheer it on its way, along a route which will be marked by concerts, shows and other celebrations.

Of the 8,000 torchbearers, 7,200 will be chosen from among people nominated by the public, and half the places are expected to go to young people between the ages of 12 and 24.
